At its Monday, March 19, meeting, the RCLS Board of Trustees had the following Talking Points:

- [Randall Enos presented](#) to the RCLS Board the services the Youth Services Consultant offers to member libraries.
- Approved the purchase of a new Sprinter delivery van.
- Reviewed and approved the 2017 RCLS State Annual Report.
- Awarded \$250 Management Professional Development Scholarships to Casey Conlin from the Haverstraw King's Daughters Public Library and Lisa Palmer from the Wallkill Public Library.
- Twelve member libraries will participate in a trial of the *Fine Free Project* in September.
- Robert Hubsher will present sessions on May 30, 2018 for ALA Library Leadership and Management Association (LLAMA) and on June 23, 2018 at the ALA Conference.

## TBBL Interest

The Library of Congress National Library Service (NLS) has kicked off a national television and radio campaign promoting FREE Talking Book and Braille Library (TBBL) services. The campaign launched on outlets including National Public Radio, the History Channel, and the Hallmark Channel. The commercials will run at three-week intervals through late 2019. New York State public libraries may receive questions from their community members about how they, a family member or a friend would apply for access to free talking book and braille library program services. Libraries across Canada have long served as valuable spaces for homeless persons, offering respite from the outdoors, books and internet access, and a space to rest or socialize. As overdose deaths began to soar several years ago, fueled by the arrival of illicit fentanyl, many libraries responded by introducing new overdose policies such as voluntary naloxone training. But at Vancouver (B.C.) Public Library, workers are prohibited from administering the drug, even if they have sought out training on their own.



## Cragsmoor Free Library Art Collection Online


The Cragsmoor Free Library was started by artists who were attracted to the extraordinary natural beauty of the area, their spouses and many local residents who obtained a provisional charter from New York State in 1913. Their art books were donated and kept in several locations until Frederick S. Dellenbaugh (explorer, author and artist) donated the land and designed the Library building. It was built from 1923 to 1925 by local craftsmen (some of whose families still live there). The founders of the Cragsmoor Art Colony, which flourished for almost 70 years, and their contemporaries donated many works to the library soon after the inception of the building. These gifts have created a unique collection, which is augmented by local present-day artists. More artists live and work in Cragsmoor today than during the time of the original art colony.

Julie Beck writes: “Some people can read a book or watch a movie once and retain the plot perfectly. But for many, the experience of consuming culture is like filling up a bathtub, soaking in it, and then watching the water run down the drain. It might leave a film in the tub, but the rest is gone. Jared Horvath, a research fellow at the University of Melbourne, says that the way people now consume information and entertainment has changed what type of memory we value—and it’s not the kind that helps you hold onto the plot of a movie you saw six months ago.”

## ✓ Voter Perceptions of Libraries: Getting From Awareness to Funding in 2018

**Tuesday, April 17 from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.**

In 2008, OCLC published *From Awareness to Funding: A Study of Library Support in America*, a study of the awareness, attitudes, and underlying motivations among US voters for supporting library funding. The research dispelled long-held assumptions and provided eye-opening insights about who supports public library funding and for what reasons. A decade later, OCLC has partnered with PLA and the ALA Office for Library Advocacy to investigate perceptions and support among US voters today, and how they may have shifted in the intervening years. In this session, presenters will share key findings and analysis from the summary report; provide new details on library super supporters and probable supporters in context with other library trends and research; and kickstart the discussion on how library leaders and advocates can act on these findings.
